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CORONAVIRUS DISEASE (COVID-19) IN MCPHERSON COUNTY

McPherson County continues to have an uptake in coronavirus disease (COVID-19) cases. If you are notified by the Health Department of being a contact of someone who is positive for COVID-19, you **MUST** quarantine at home for 14 days. This means that a negative test will not return an exposed person to work/sports/daycare/etc. sooner than 14 days. If you are a contact, decide to be tested, and it comes back negative, you **STILL** have to finish your 14-day period because you may become contagious anytime during the rest of the 14 days. We do **NOT** routinely recommend testing contacts unless symptoms arise or a high risk individual is involved. People who have not had direct exposure to someone with COVID-19 do not need to quarantine and are not excluded from work/sports/daycare/etc.

If you are being tested for COVID-19, you are considered a Person Under Investigation (PUI). The PUI **MUST** isolate while waiting on results. The PUI should isolate away from anyone in their household. If they are not able to isolate away from the household members by staying in their own room, the entire household must quarantine while awaiting results to reduce exposure.

If a person in quarantine does not develop any COVID-19 symptoms, then they are released from quarantine at the end of 14 days. If symptoms do develop during those 14 days, the person is to contact their primary provider for further evaluation and/or testing. People who have been diagnosed with COVID-19 may be released from isolation at the direction of the Health Department when it has been 10 days since the onset of symptoms **AND** 72 hours since symptoms have resolved. This symptom-based method of returning people to work is preferred to a testing-based method of returning people to work because tests can still remain positive long after the virus is no longer active.

McPherson County Health Department reports 131 total confirmed cases of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in McPherson County. 111 of the total confirmed cases have now met recovery guidelines set forth by the KDHE. There are two current hospitalizations and zero deaths. One hospitalization is a previously announced case that is a male in his 30s and is currently ventilated.

- Positive case #124 was identified on July 24 and is a symptomatic female in her 60s with unknown exposure and is recovering at home.
- Positive case #125 was identified on July 25 and is a symptomatic male in his 20s with known exposure and is recovering at home.
- Positive case #126 was identified on July 26 and is a symptomatic female in her 60s with unknown exposure and is recovering at home.
- Positive case #127 was identified on July 27 and is a symptomatic male in his 50s with unknown exposure and is hospitalized.
- Positive case #128 was identified on July 27 and is a symptomatic female in her 20s with known exposure and is recovering at home.
- Positive case #129 was identified today and is a symptomatic male in his 80s with known exposure and is recovering at home.
- Positive case #130 was identified today and is a symptomatic female in her 40s with unknown exposure and is recovering at home.
- Positive case #131 was identified today and is a symptomatic male in his 60s with known exposure and is recovering at home.

Here are updated statistics representing the 131 cases we've identified in McPherson County:

- Number of asymptomatic cases: 15
- Number of cases with unknown exposure: 37
- Cases above 60 years of age: 30
- Cases between 50 and 59 years of age: 20
- Cases between 40 and 49 years of age: 18
- Cases between 30 and 39 years of age: 15
- Cases between 18 and 29 years of age: 38
- Cases under 18 years of age: 10
- Female cases: 79
- Male cases: 52
- Total number of hospitalized cases (not necessarily active hospitalizations): 10
- Total number of ventilated cases (not necessarily active ventilated cases): 4

KDHE and MCHD continue to mandate a 14-day home quarantine for Kansas if you have done any of the following:

- Traveled to:
 - Florida on or after June 29.
 - Arizona between June 17 – July 27.
- Traveled on a cruise ship or river cruise on or after March 15.
- Traveled internationally to Bahrain or French Guiana July 14 – July 26.
- Traveled internationally on or after July 14 to countries with a CDC Level 3 Travel Health Notice, including China, Iran, European Schengen area, United Kingdom, Republic of Ireland and Brazil. International travelers must follow [CDC guidance and protocols](#).

McPherson County is in Phase 3 of Reopening Kansas. Updated documents can be found on mcpersoncountys.us on the home page, under "COVID-19: Reopening McPherson County." McPherson County Health Department recommends McPherson County remains in Phase 3 at least until August 17th, 2020. This decision extends Phase 3 by two incubation periods and is based off the number of positive cases with unknown exposure and the continuous increase in new cases. Extending it by four weeks instead of two will allow businesses and communities to plan for additional precautions beyond a two-week interval. The Health Department constantly assesses the presence of COVID-19 in McPherson County and our recommendations reflect the data we collect.

McPherson County Board of Health (County Commissioners) passed a resolution to opt out of Governor Kelly's Executive Order 20-52 on July 2nd, 2020. McPherson County Board of Health recommends the McPherson County communities still follow the recommendations from McPherson County Health Department and McPherson County Health Officer, which includes wearing face masks while in public when 6-foot of distance cannot be maintained between individuals. Mask wearing can and will significantly decrease the amount of COVID-19 spread in our communities, both from asymptomatic and symptomatic individuals.

McPherson County residents are encouraged to help slow the spread of coronavirus by:

- Following Phase 3 of Reopening Kansas and McPherson County (mcpersoncountys.us).
- Maintaining social distancing.
- Avoiding gatherings in groups greater than 45-persons.
- Wearing cloth face coverings or homemade masks when in public.
- Practicing cough etiquette and washing hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.

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
